My archival journey began similarly as my Black history journey began—on the margins. My Black history was being erased within the academic curriculum, so I felt the need to research my own Black history and genealogy from the archives. In essence, my talk will review the ongoing journey to find myself/ my ancestors in the archives. I call this talk “a sensitive walk”, as I must always recognize that I was navigating the absence of my ancestor’s voices. I was also simultaneously inserting my physical presence, as a Black scholar, to be heard and to validate that we were and are still here. In summary, my presentation is a review of my PhD research, Master’s research, and my on-going genealogy as a proud Sixth generation Black woman from New Brunswick.
